- George A quick-witted man who is Lennie's guardian and best friend.
- Lennie A mentally disabled, but physically strong man who travels with George and is his constant companion.
- Candy An aging ranch handyman, Candy lost his hand in an accident and worries about his future on the ranch.
- Curly The boss' son, a young, confrontational character, once a semiprofessional boxer.
- Slim A "jerkline skinner," the main driver of a mule team and the "prince of the ranch". Slim is greatly respected by many of the characters.
- Carlson A "thick bodied" ranch hand, he kills Candy's aging dog.
- Curly's wife A young, pretty woman, who is mistrusted by her husband. The other characters refer to her only as "Curley's wife".
- Crooks Crooks, the black stable-hand, gets his name from his crooked back. Proud, bitter, and funny, he is isolated from the other men because of the color of his skin.
- Witt A ranch hand and blacksmith. He is a "nice fella and as clean guy as you want to meet."

- **Weed** the city George and Lennie had previously worked as ranch hands.
- Soledad the California city in which the novel is set. One of the main themes of the novel is loneliness. Soledad is Spanish for solitude or loneliness.
- **Salinas** a large city near the ranch. Steinbeck's hometown.
- ranch where the majority of the novel take place.
- **bunkhouse** where the ranch hands slept, where the fight between Lennie and Curly takes place.
- barn where Lennie killed the puppy and Curly's wife
- **stream** where George and Lennie slept in the beginning and where Lenny dies in the end.

- Born in 1902
- Graduated from Salinas High School in 1919
- Worked as a ranch hand during summers
- Went to Stanford and majored in English
- Wrote his first book in 1929
- Published in Of Mice and Men 1937
- Received Nobel Prize in 1962
- Died in New York City in 1968
